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Professor Jaff discusses the legal burdens placed on people who choose not to marry and argues that the Constitution supports elimination of marital status distinctions in the law. She examines the "traditional" concept of family and proposes less oppressive alternatives.

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Professors Pedrick and Dahl evaluate the methods used to ratify proposed constitutional amendments. The Article focuses on developing a rationale for congressional choice of a particular mode of ratification. The authors advocate use of the convention method, which provides for a democratic choice by the people.

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Professor Lively examines first amendment analysis of new media. He argues that modern regulation may disserve first amendment interests and that media-specific analysis is dangerous and misguided.

JUDICIAL RESPONSES TO LONG-TERM SOCIETAL DECLINE	<i>R. George Wright</i>	271
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Professor Wright discusses theories of societal decadence in general terms, and then considers examples involving judicial responses to obscene and offensive speech, criminal behavior, and the rights of undocumented aliens. His analysis concentrates on the judicial system's potential for response to perceived or actual manifestations of broad long-term societal decline.

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
