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The goal of meaningful Indian self-government is too often hampered by haphazard federal statutes and regulations. Most federal regulatory statutes are silent regarding their effect on Indian lands, thus problems of regulatory jurisdiction are often settled in the courts. The results are conflicting rulings, high legal fees for Indians, and denial of Indian self-determination. The author offers proposals to prevent the confused and unintended extension of federal power over Indian country.

# ARIZONA'S MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ACT: AN OVERVIEW AND AN ANALYSIS OF PROPOSED AMENDMENTS ............ Daniel W. Shuman,

In 1974 the Arizona legislature enacted the Mental Health Services Act, a complete revision of Arizona statutory law regarding the civil commitment of the mentally disordered. In this article the authors explain the major provisions of the Act, discuss problems in its scope and operation, and examine an array of proposed amendments designed to smooth some of the Act's rough edges.

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Perjury is a serious criminal offense. Surprisingly, even where clear evidence of perjury exists, no civil action for damages is permitted against a perjurer. A judicially created policy of 400 years duration extends an absolute civil immunity to all participants in any legal proceeding. The author proposes that the absolute civil immunity should be limited to permit a suit in tort against a perjurer, and formulates the elements of such an action.

#### EXPUNGEMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH RECORDS IN THE CIVIL

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The author examines present protections against abuse of mental health records and finds them inadequate. Expungement of civil commitment records is suggested as necessary to provide sufficient privacy protection and a statutory remedy is proposed.

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### **EMPLOYMENT RIGHTS OF RESIDENT ALIENS**

The federal government restricts state provisions denying aliens entry into professions under the doctrines of equal protection and federal preemption of immigration. The author analyzes the history of discrimination against aliens in employment and questions the legitimacy of present Arizona statutes restricting alien employment.

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
