

10th INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS

Directions for Preparing Abstracts

The directions must be strictly adhered to, otherwise it will not be possible to include it in the abstract book. Please read all instructions carefully before preparing your abstract.

The abstract must be in English.

Your abstract will be photographed and printed by a photo-offset process directly from the original you supply.

Abstracts must be typed within a rectangle measuring 12 cm wide by 18 cm deep. Please use a good quality white paper. **DO NOT FOLD IT! ENCLOSE A PIECE OF CARDBOARD IN THE ENVELOPE!** Ideally an electric typewriter should be used; use a carbon ribbon if possible; otherwise use a good quality black ribbon; use elite type face, 12 characters to the inch.

Clean the type face before using. **DO NOT ERASE.** Type single spaced.

Figures (black and white) and tables may be included, if desired.

Your abstract will appear in the abstract book exactly as submitted, and the same size. Any erasure, smudge, error, misspelling, poor hyphenation and deviations from good English usage will be apparent in the published abstract. We will not be able to publish poorly prepared abstracts.

Commencing in the top left-hand corner, type the title in **CAPITAL** letters. It should not exceed 150 characters (including spaces); do **NOT** underline. On the next line place the author's name (in lower case); underline the name of the author presenting the paper. On the next line place the name and address of the institution where the work was done.

On the next line, indent 4 spaces and

type the abstract. Paragraphs are permitted, but are often unnecessary. Where non-standard abbreviations are used, spell out in full the first time mentioned, followed immediately by the abbreviation (in parenthesis).

Any special symbols that are not on your typewriter must be drawn in **BLACK** ink.

Your abstract should be as informative and representative of the paper as possible. Try not to use statements such as "results will be discussed", or "data will be presented."
