

deep system are practically not dilated but an anastomosis is rapidly established between deep and superficial lymph vessels. These anastomoses are gradually dilated and transport the lymph from the deep lymphatic system below the site of transplantation.

Comment: This work confirms that the restoration of circulation in the transplanted extremity is made possible by a regeneration of the superficial lymphatic system whereas the regeneration of the deep system is much slower or does not take place at all. P. MÁLEK
